Fund Objective

The objective of this portfolio is to provide capital growth over the medium to long term. The portfolio aims to achieve a return of at least 5% above CPI per annum measured over rolling 3 year periods. This portfolio aims to limit downside risk over the medium to long term, but investors must be able to withstand capital volatility in the short term.

Fund Strategy

The portfolio will adopt a flexible approach and the asset class exposure will be varied depending on opportunities in the market. The portfolio will invest in a range of asset classes including equities, bonds, money market instruments, listed property as well as international equities and fixed interest investments. Each instrument will be selected on a bottom-up basis and based on its individual risk/reward status, and ability to deliver on the long term objective of the fund. The Investment manager will also be allowed to invest in listed and unlisted financial instruments (derivatives) and CIS portfolios from time to time as allowed by the Act in order to achieve its investment objectives.

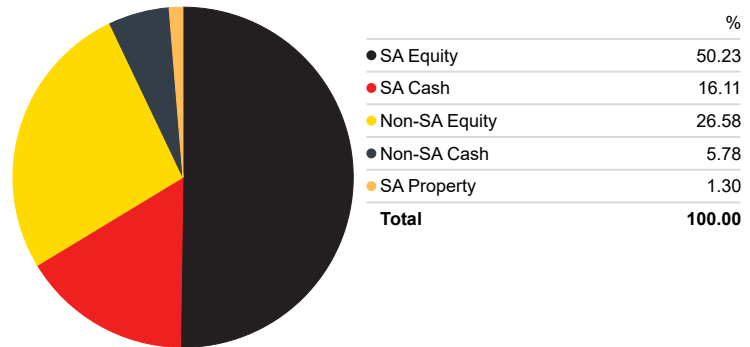

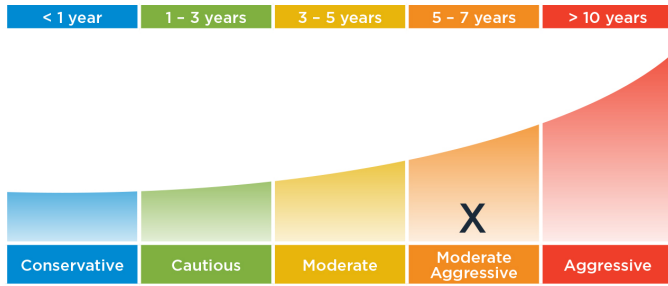

Glossary Terms

Annualised Returns

Annualised return is the weighted average compound growth rate over the period measured.

Asset Allocation

Asset allocation is the percentage holding in different asset classes (i.e. equities, bonds, property, etc.). It is used to determine the level of diversification in a portfolio.

Distributions

The income that is generated from an investment and given to investors through monthly, quarterly, bi-annual or annual distribution pay-outs.

Derivatives

Derivatives are instruments generally used as an instrument to protect against risk (capital losses), but can also be used for speculative purposes. Examples are futures, options and swaps.

Liquidity

The ability to easily turn assets or investments into cash.

Information Ratio

The Information Ratio measures the market risk-adjusted performance of an investment or portfolio. The greater a portfolio's Information Ratio, the better its risk-adjusted performance has been compared to the market in general.

LISP (Linked Investment Service Provider)

A Linked Investment Service Provider is a financial institution which packages, distributes and administers a broad range of unit trust based investments. Any investment made through these products gives an investor a single point of entry into a selection of different investments.

Maximum Drawdown

The maximum drawdown measures the highest peak to trough loss experienced by the fund.

Money Market Instruments

A money market instrument is a low risk, highly liquid, short-term (one year or less) debt instrument, issued by financial institutions or governments, that tend to have lower returns than high-risk investments.

Participatory Interests

When you buy a unit trust, your money is pooled with that of many other investors. The total value of the pool of invested money in a unit trust fund is split into equal portions called participatory interests or units. When you invest your money in a unit trust, you buy a portion of the participatory interests in the total unit trust portfolio. Participatory interests are therefore the number of units that you have in a particular unit trust portfolio.

Risk-adjusted returns

Risk-adjusted return refines an investment's return by measuring how much risk is involved in producing that return, which is generally expressed as a number or rating.

Sharpe Ratio

The Sharpe Ratio measures total risk-adjusted performance of an investment or portfolio. It measures the amount of risk associated with the returns generated by the portfolio and indicates whether a portfolio's returns are due to excessive risk or not. The greater a portfolio's Sharpe ratio, the better its risk-adjusted performance has been (i.e. a higher return with a contained risk profile, where the portfolio manager is not taking excessive risk to achieve those returns).

Standard Deviation

Standard deviation (also called monthly volatility) is a measure of how much returns on an investment change from month to month. It is typically used by investors to gauge the volatility expected of an investment.

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Portfolio Manager Comment

As at 31 March 2020

The first quarter of 2020 has been very tough for investors around the world and the Baobab SCI Flexible Fund was not spared, despite significant offshore assets and cash holdings. Many of the Fund's key holdings depreciated significantly, especially those linked to the South African economy. A key detractor was HCI which has significant exposure to the hotel and casino industry, two sectors that have come to a complete standstill in recent weeks. While there have not been many winners during the quarter, AngloGold has performed well, as did Liberty Broadband which we sold at a very healthy profit before the virus hit markets.

We have been fairly active during the quarter, particularly on the buying side where we have taken advantage of some exceptional prices, both locally and abroad. Offshore we were assertive buyers of Bolloré, a French listed investment company where we gain very discounted exposure to a world class asset in Universal Music Group. This is a quality asset that is likely to list during the next few years and is largely unaffected by the virus. We also used price weakness to add to our position in Cameco Corporation, a Canadian listed uranium miner that we think will benefit from the continued growth in the nuclear industry as climate change is likely to remain an issue going forward. We introduced a new position in a restaurant software provider, Par Technology, and bought two tanker stocks that are beneficiaries of the glut in global oil supply, Diamond S Shipping and Scorpio Tankers.

On the domestic front we introduced a new holding in Italtile, a high quality, integrated tile manufacturer and retailer. With high insider ownership and net cash on the balance sheet, we think Italtile is a company that will survive this crisis, but eventually thrive again and reward patient shareholders. We also added to our position in Discovery Holdings at a very attractive entry point.

Looking forward, our expectation is that we will get through this crisis, but that the journey will be a bumpy one as the economic impact of the current lockdowns will be severe. We will continue to balance the short-term headwinds with some of the exceptional long-term opportunities that we are seeing at an individual company level. We still have a reasonable amount of cash available to take advantage of these opportunities in the months ahead.
